The Story of Haydn's "The Creation"

At the 1791 Handel Festival in Westminster Abbey Haydn was overwhelmed by the monumental sublimity of the choruses in Handel's "The Messiah", performed by a gargantuan array of over 1000 players and singers. He wished to compose a work on a similarly exalted biblical theme that would appeal to a broad public.

For the time being nothing came of the idea. But just before he left England for the last time, in the summer of 1795, the impresario and violinist Johann Peter Salomon handed him an anonymous English libretto on the subject of *The Creation* which had allegedly been intended for Handel half a century earlier.

Haydn immediately saw the musical potential in *The Creation* text, whose main sources were the book of *Genesis*, Milton's *Paradise Lost* (especially for the animal descriptions in Part Two, and the hymn and love duet in Part Three) and, for several of the choruses of praise, the book of *Psalms*.

Towards the end of 1796, a libretto had been translated and adapted by the Imperial Court Librarian, the formidable Baron Gottfried van Swieten. By the same time Haydn had already begun to sketch the visionary 'Representation of Chaos'. Never one to hold back, Swieten annotated the manuscript he prepared for Haydn with suggestions for musical setting - a fugue here, descriptive tone-painting there - some of which were adopted, others rejected by the composer. He was, though, adamant that the words 'Let there be Light' - 'And there was Light' should only be said once, thereby claiming a small share in one of the most elemental inspirations in all music.

In composing the work Haydn felt he was performing an act of religious devotion, however the Catholic church was quick to take offence at its non-moralistic tone and alleged "secularity" of expression, banning it from places of worship. But the church could not hinder the work's immediate success. "The Creation" received immediate acclaim when it was performed before a packed aristocratic audience in the Schwarzenberg Palace in Vienna, first at an open rehearsal on 29 April 1798 and then at its official premiere the following day.

On 19 March 1799, in the Imperial Burgtheatre, and with anticipation at fever-pitch, the non-aristocratic Viennese public were able to hear Haydn's great oratorio for themselves.

The end result was the greatest triumph of Haydn's career.

James Southall (Conductor)

James Southall is a conductor, pianist and coach and is currently Music Director of the Opera School at the Royal Welsh College of Music and Drama. He was previously on the staff at Welsh National Opera where he conducted Madam Butterfly, La Traviata, Roberto Devereux, Carmen, Don Giovanni, The Magic Flute, Così fan tutte, Die Fledermaus, The Barber of Seville, Sweeney Todd and Frank Martin's Le Vin Herbé, amongst others.

James has conducted several leading opera companies and orchestras including English Touring Opera, Sinfonia Cymru, L'orchestra Haydn di Bolzano e Trento, Camerata Nordica and Opéra de Baugé.

James was Organ Scholar at Queens' Cambridge and is an alumnus of the RCM. He is an accomplished pianist and has performed recitals at numerous venues including Wigmore Hall and Cadogan Hall. He is a former winner of the Accompanist's Prize at the Kathleen Ferrier Awards and the Maggie Teyte Competition.

James is delighted to return to the island to work with the Jersey Festival Choir and the St Cecilia Orchestra.



Karla Grant

Karla Grant is a Scottish soprano with a Masters in Vocal Performance and a First-Class Honours Bachelor of Music in Vocal Performance from the RCS while under the tutelage of Wilma MacDougall. Karla is currently based in London and continues her vocal development with Susan Waters.

Most recently, Karla performed the role of Pamina in Weimar, Germany at the Lyric Opera Studio in July 2022 and the role of Sandman in the Alexander Gibson Opera School's production of Hänsel und Gretel in January 2022. In August 2022, Karla performed in the chorus of Beethoven's Fidelio with Philharmonia Voices, conducted by Donald Runnicles alongside renowned artist Sir Willard White. Opera scene roles include Gretel (Hänsel und Gretel, Humperdinck) at a short course with the National Opera Studio, and Vixen (The Cunning Little Vixen, Janáček), Giulietta (I Capuleti e i Montecchi,

Bellini), Susanna (Le Nozze di Figaro, Mozart), and Calisto (La Calisto, Cavalli) at the RCS.

Karla was recently awarded First Prize in the Governor's Recital Prize for Singing, and Highly Commended in the Elgar Spedding Memorial Prize for Lieder at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. This year, Karla is an Oxford Lieder Young Artist 2022/23 and Leeds Lieder Festival Young Artist 2022. Karla has had the wonderful opportunity to perform in masterclasses with renowned artists Dame Janet Baker, Dorothea Röschmann, Graham Johnson OBE and Malcolm Martineau.

Karla is proud to work with Live Music Now Scotland as part of 'Vox Duo', a vocal ensemble which she established in 2018. In December of 2021, Vox Duo released a recording of a new composition with Earthtones Trio, which has been broadcast on BBC Radio 4 Woman's Hour.



Seumas Begg

Born in Scotland, tenor Seumas Begg is a graduate of the Royal Northern College of Music and the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland. A versatile performer who has covered a broad range of repertory working for companies in the UK and around Europe.

He has just made his Royal Opera House debut in the world premier of Oliver Leith's opera, Last Days. His further credits include John Yoo The New Prince (Dutch National Opera); Gherardo Gianni Schicchi (Teatro Communale Traviso); Pony Express Rider La Fanciulla del West and Mendel Fiddler on the Roof (Grange Park Opera); Max Fantasio, Ein Tierhaendler and Kellner 1 Der Rosenkavalier (Garsington Opera); Raoul de St. Brioche The Merry Widow, Goro Madama Butterfly and Fenton Falstaff (Opera Bohemia); and Elijah in the world premiere of Navigate the Blood (NOISE). He also recently made his west end debut as Gloucester, Jamy and Grey in the Donmar Warehouse production of Henry V which was broadcast internationally as part of National Theatre live.

Subsequent roles in his repertoire include Spoletta Tosca; Lippo Fiorentino Street Scene; Brighella Ariadne auf Naxos, Gastone La Traviata, Sailor Dido

and Aeneas; M. Lacouf Mamelles des Tireseas; Monostatos Die Zauberflöte, Ein Soldat Kaiser von Atlantis.



Robert Rice

One of the UK's most versatile baritones, Robert Rice was a choral scholar at King's College, Cambridge before gaining a DipRAM under Mark Wildman. His concert repertoire is extensive and varied: in recent years he has performed Humperdinck at the Berlin Konzerthaus, Bach's St John Passion at the Southern Cathedrals Festival and Howard Goodall at St Paul's Cathedral in London. His main specialism is in works of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries and he has been involved in premières of diverse new pieces throughout his career, those by Jacques Cohen, Paul Drayton, Errolyn Wallen and Hayley Jenkins being notable recent examples. His experience in performing contemporary music led to the creation of roles in stage works by Paul Clark, Judith Bingham and Nigel Osborne. He made his debut at London's South Bank in a staging of Maxwell Davies' Eight Songs for a Mad King, Robert's most recent collaboration, with pianist Elizabeth Mucha, began with the staged recital Art Sung: Alma Mahler (Wilton's Music Hall), and continued in April 2019 with a 20th- and 21st-century English Song recital for York's Late Music series. He also collaborates with guitarist Erich Schachtner in Germany and the UK on programmes of lieder and lute songs.

Robert's solo recordings include Judas in Elgar's The Apostles with Canterbury Choral Society and the Philharmonia Orchestra, and his version of Cornelius' Die Drei Könige (The Three Kings), with the choir Polyphony, is a Christmas radio favourite. His CD of 29 Songs by David Power with Pianist William Vann is shortly to be released. When not performing or recording, he leads workshops, adjudicates, and teaches widely, including for the National Youth Choir, Rodolfus Foundation Choral Courses, King's, Clare and Jesus College Choirs in Cambridge, the choir of King's College, London, and the London Symphony Chorus. Novello have published many of his vocal arrangements, while others are sung worldwide, and have been recorded, by the King's Singers. His nickname, Berty, has confused countless acquaintances, and he often tries to arrange his singing engagements around skiing trips to the Alps, while well aware that it should be the other way around.
